Samhain, the Origins of Halloween

Halloween, formally known as All-Hallows Eve, is celebrated a lot differently now than it would've been centuries ago. With Halloween being days away, maybe it's time you learn just where this holiday comes from and why Americans spend so much time and money on it.

The origins of Halloween date back to the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain (pronounced Saw-in). The Celts lived 2000 years ago in what is now Northern France, the UK, and Ireland. They believed that on the night of October 31st the ghosts of the dead returned to earth; to celebrate this, the Druids (Celtic Priests) would build huge sacred bonfires where the townspeople would gather in order to burn crops and animals as sacrifices to the Celtic deities. While performing these rituals, the Celts wore costumes that typically consisted of animal heads and skins. After the bonfire, the Celts would attempt to tell each other's fortunes for the new year, for November 1st was their New Year's Day.

By 43 A.D., the Roman Empire had almost completely conquered the Celtic territory; in the span of the 400 years that they ruled over the Celtic lands, two festivals of Roman origin were combined with the Celtic tradition of Samhain. The first festival was one to commemorate the passing of the dead; it took place on a day in late October and was called ... Continued on page 4...

Feralia. The second was a day to honor the goddess of fruit and trees, Pomona. Her symbol was an apple which some believe that this led to the tradition of bobbing for apples.

On May 13, 609 A.D., Pope Boniface IV dedicated the pantheon in Rome to honor all of the Christian Martyrs, and the Catholic feast of All Martyrs Day was established in the western church. Later, Pope Gregory the Third expanded the holiday to include All Saints Day and moved the holiday from May 13th to November 1st. Within the 9th century, the church made November 2nd All Souls Day in order to honor the dead. It's believed that the church was attempting to replace the Celtics festival of Samhain to a related church-sanctioned holiday. The holiday was celebrated similarly to the Celtics holiday in the way that they too had big bonfires, but instead, they added parades and dressed up as saints, angels, and devils. All Saints Day was also known as All Hallows, which later became known as All Hallows' Eve, and finally became what we know today as Halloween.

The celebration of Halloween was at first extremely limited in colonial New England compared to Maryland and the Southern colonies; this was due to the rich Protestants belief systems. By the 19th century, Americans started celebrating annual autumn festivities, but Halloween was yet to be celebrated everywhere in the country.

In the second half of the 19th century, America started becoming flooded with new immigrants. These immigrants mainly came from Ireland due to the Irish potato famine; the Irish immigrants were the ones to help Americans all over truly start to celebrate the holiday known as Halloween.

Back in England, they celebrated what was still called All Souls Day; during their celebrations, poor people would beg for food and families would give them little cakes known as Soul Cakes in return for their promise to pray for the families' dead relatives. The distribution of these cakes were encouraged by the church as a way to replace the ancient practice of leaving food and wine for Roman spirits. This practice eventually changed into what was known as going a souling, when children who would visit houses in the neighborhood ... Continued on page 5 ...

were given ale, food, and money. It was still thought that ghosts came back to the human world, and the townspeople believed that they would encounter a ghost when they left their home. To avoid this from happening, they would wear masks in order to trick the spirits into thinking they too were a spirit.

Borrowing from the European traditions, Americans began dressing up in costumes and going from house to house asking for food or money which lead to today's tradition of going trick or treating. The young women of the century believed that on Halloween they could divide the name or appearance of their soulmate by doing yarn tricks or by using apple pairings.

In the late 1800's, there was a move to turn Halloween from being about ghosts, pranks, and witchcraft. They instead decided that Halloween should be more about community and neighborly Halloween became known for get-togethers. parties that included both adults and children with food, games, and festive costumes. This tradition lasted until the 1950's when town leaders successfully evolved the holiday to be directed towards the younger generation. Parents were encouraged to take out the grotesque parts out of Halloween celebrations; due to this, Halloween then lost almost all of its superstitious and religious overtones by the time the 20th century rolled around.

Due to the turn to create Halloween as a children's holiday, trick or treating was brought back; it was a relatively inexpensive way to bring together the entire community to share the celebration. Today, Americans spend an estimated 6 billion annually on Halloween making it the second largest commercial holiday after Christmas, with approximately 3 billion spent on candy for trick or treaters.

ArcelorMittal Bought by Cleveland Cliffs

ArcelorMittal, one of the United States largest steelmaker companies for years, has been bought out by Cleveland Cliffs and will be buying six steel mills, eight finishing facilities, two iron ore mining and pelletizing operations, and three coal and coal making operations. The steel industry has taken over a lot of the U.S. and worldwide mining cooperation.

According to the Duluth News Tribune, Cleveland Cliffs would acquire Virginia, Hibbing, Eveleth, Forbes, Silverbay, and Babbit mines. This decision



Movies in a Pandemic

For decades, people everywhere have enjoyed the cinema and the sights and sounds that it came with have become a landmark of American and international culture. The first "moving picture" was seen in 1893 during a demonstration held by the Edison Company. Since then, it has evolved into a massive multi-billion dollar industry. The very first moving pictures were usually just a few minutes long. They would include scenes of nature, fun comedies, news-like announcements, or other short clips. Some movies had sound, others didn't, contrary to the common myth that the movies back then were all silent. Although it was just short parts of music and sound effects. audio was existent. The cinema evolved over the years to include color. In 1909, the first demonstration to the public of colored movies took place and was created hand-stenciling and toning the film to produce, ironically named, "natural color." Early color film was expensive, and wouldn't show up much again until the 1930's, appearing in now timeless films like The Wizard of Oz, and Gone With the Wind, which both came out in 1939. The Wizard of Oz was especially popular due to the transition between black and white to full color in the movie.

The first attempts at matching sound with picture were created by running a separate record disc that played the sound as the movie ran. In those days, 35mm film was used. This was a pretty primitive time for film, but as it went on it got more advanced. That's good news, although the pandemic we've been in raises the question: "Will the cinemas around the world ever be the same?" Nobody knows now, but the answer to that will only come with time. Hopefully so.
