They learned about each region of the United States and some created their own version of their favorite piece of a state. They made dioramas designed to replicate the real life landmarks and monuments!










EGHS GRADES 7-12 MAKING SOME NOISE IN MUSIC

Mr. Szumal's General Music Class (7th and 8th grades) put on a short performance for some high students and staff -bucket drumming! Bucket drumming, also called street drumming, is a style of music which involves drumming on plastic buckets and other objects to create melodies. The most common object used by bucket drummers are fivegallon plastic buckets, but other objects can be used, including glass bottles, pots, and pans. The students sounded great!



VHS GRADES 7-12 HOME MAINTENANCE

Students in Mr. Foster's Home Maintenance class built three mobile wall units to be used to hang and tape drywall. These three trainers will be assembled/disassembled and then re-used for future classes. These trainers will give students the opportunity to measure and cut drywall, cut drywall to fit around electrical boxes, make drywall repairs, tape and mud drywall on flat surfaces, and finish off inside and outside corners. Next year, the students will also be painting these trainers.







TEST SEASON

All district schools are entering the testing season and VHS is no exception. ACT testing for Juniors who selected to take the test completed it on April 4. The week of April 10 is the start of MCA testing with reading for all 7th, 8th, and 10th grade students. The week of April 24 will be the math testing for all students in 7th, 8th, and 11th grades. The final MCA tests will take place the week of May 1 for 8th and 10th grades. Please take note of these dates and encourage your student to get a good night sleep, eat a good breakfast, and to do their best!

2023-24 REGISTRATION

We have completed the student registration process for Rock Ridge High School. All students in the Virginia and Eveleth-Gilbert campuses, along with all current 6th grade students, were able to enter their course requests online through Powerschool. From these registrations, we will be able to create sections and begin to build the master schedule. Unfortunately, not all student requests will be honored as it can never work out perfectly for all students and for some classes that have limited interest, it is just not feasible to run the course. Every attempt will be made to provide students with the courses they selected. Schedule changes after the schedule is created are minimal as staffing is driven by student requests.
