#### RANGER JIM COMES TO STEAM



# PARKVIEW GRADES PREK-2 F.I.E.R.C.E. FINALE

First Graders at Parkview completed their first Project-Based Learning unit in November. They have spent the past two months exploring the inquiry question, "What does it mean to be a F.I.E.R.C.E citizen in our school community?"

The acronym F.I.E.R.C.E stands for focused, inquisitive, effective collaborator, responsible, compassionate, and engaged. These important characteristics will help our Rock Ridge students' success at school and in the world.

First grade students spent time engaging in read-alouds, class discussions, and activities that helped them understand what each word means and how they can demonstrate that characteristic at school. Their public product was a video showing the different letters of F.I.E.R.C.E in all of the different places within the school.

The students worked in groups to brainstorm situations where they could show each characteristic. Then, they practiced their scene, and finally recorded their scene while also explaining what each word of F.I.E.R.C.E means.




# RRHS GRADES 7-12 STANDING PROUD PROJECT

Students designed the awards stands, estimated materials, assembled, and painted the stands. Students also used the laser engrave to cut out some real custom numbers that they painted and fastened to the boxes. A cart was also designed and constructed to assist with storing and transporting the awards stands.

This was a great project to start this class because it allowed students to become familiar with project estimation and tool operation. For the rest of this Home Maintenance class, students will be focusing on wall framing, sheetrock installation, residential wiring, and plumbing.















## CHICKEN SOUP FOR THE SOUL

Students in 7th grade Family and Consumer Science class enjoyed making chicken noodle soup recently. They are working in the new, state of the art culinary kitchens. They learned new knife skills, quickly adjusted to cooking on commercial gas ranges, and successfully tackled doing dishes in the 3-compartment sinks and dishwasher.

They are getting a great start in cooking for themselves and their families, and at the same time, they are gaining experience to work in the field of food service.


