




E-XCEPTIONAL STUDENTS

Reflecting on the experience, Mrs. Spry remarked, "Teaching CPR to fifth graders goes beyond just imparting a skill – it's about instilling a sense of empowerment and responsibility. These students have proven themselves capable of rising to the occasion, and I have no doubt that they will carry these lessons with them for life."

As they continue their educational journey, one thing is certain – they are well-prepared to make a difference, one heartbeat at a time.









RRHS GRADES 7-12 ESSENTIA HEALTH CARE DAY

Administrator of the Arrowhead Region, Sam Stone and Workforce Development Specialist, Andrea Chartier, both of Essentia, kicked off "Explore Essentia Health Day" with a presentation for 800 RRHS students in the Performing Art Center on Jan. 31.

Students learned about a hypothetical patient with a broken leg moving through various aspects of healthcare for treatment. Throughout the rest of the day, the Essentia Health and Science Wing at Rock Ridge was full of energized and engaged student learners. Dozens of Essentia employees from various departments fielded questions from students seeking to learn more about healthcare careers. Each department had a display table and students participated in hands-on learning. RRHS and Essentia's partnership will advance the quality of education and strengthen the progressive healthcare industry on the Iron Range for years to come.

RRHS students attended the MN North College - Mesabi Range Open House Feb. 1. Senior, Kyle Beaudette, took advantage of his visit and applied for college with support from the Eveleth Campus's Student Services Department. Other seniors weighed the option of accepting apprenticeships or continuing their education after high school at a local campus.





Exploring opportunities and making informed decisions is important for individual student success as they enter the workforce or attend college. Rock Ridge High School continues to partner with local stakeholders to support all students.



HOW ABOUT LAKE SUPERIOR COLLEGE?

Rock Ridge High School student spent Feb. 2 with science teacher Mr. Strasser and Mrs. Oja, Career Counselor, at Lake Superior College exploring technical programs leading to healthcare careers. The day was packed with hands-on learning activities.

In the biology lab, college students learn skills to become phlebotomists, medical lab techs, and medical lab assistants. But today, it was Rock Ridge students who identified blood types, determined if a specimen contained staphylococcus or streptococcus bacteria, and used gel electrophoresis to separate DNA.

Students toured the physical therapy program as college students practiced therapeutic massage techniques and the instructor gave an overview of the medical equipment used in the college's clinic. Instructors explained roles of respiratory technicians while students learned about ventilators and chest percussion therapy devices. Time spent in the surgical technician program taught student learners how to don a surgical gown and gloves properly without contamination.

Students returned to the high school with more awareness of different healthcare careers and technical education programs provided in our region. Rock Ridge student learners will be more prepared and better educated as they make their post secondary decisions.

At the end of this unforgettable day, Rock Ridge and Concordia College students shared a catered meal together before presenting a wonderful concert for a very receptive audience. All in all, this was an amazing day of laughter and learning, fun and excitement, memories, new experiences, and new friendships too. 


LETTERS FOR A CAUSE


