# NORTH STAR GRADES 3-6 BUILDING SCHOLARS, NOT JUST STUDENTS

At North Star Elementary, the guiding mantra "Our Building, Our Responsibility" is more than just a slogan—it's a way of life. This year, staff and students have embraced a renewed focus on scholarship, emphasizing the importance of academic excellence and personal growth. The school has shifted its perspective from seeing children as students to recognizing them as scholars, individuals who actively seek knowledge and work to contribute meaningfully to their community. From the classrooms to the hallways, the commitment to this vision is evident in every interaction.



Research underscores the importance of fostering a scholarly mindset in young people. According to the National Education Association, when students view themselves as scholars, they develop a sense of purpose and motivation that directly correlates with higher achievement and improved engagement. Scholars take ownership of their learning, asking questions, setting goals, and striving for excellence. At North Star Elementary, staff are empowering students with these skills by cultivating an environment where inquiry and responsibility are celebrated daily.





One of the unique ways this philosophy is implemented is through the intentional language used by staff. Teachers and administrators frequently ask students, "Are you prepared to be a scholar today?" This simple question reminds students of their potential and encourages them to adopt a growth mindset. It aligns with research from psychologist Carol Dweck, whose work highlights the power of believing in one's ability to learn and improve through effort. By instilling these principles, North Star Elementary is helping students embrace challenges and view mistakes as opportunities for growth.



The impact of this approach is already visible in the school community. Students are rising to the challenge, taking pride in their work, and demonstrating greater responsibility for their actions and learning. Teachers report an increased sense of engagement in the classroom and stronger collaboration among peers. From group projects that encourage critical thinking to leadership roles that emphasize responsibility, every facet of the school day reinforces the idea that each child is a scholar with unique talents and the ability to make a difference.



As North Star Elementary continues its journey under the banner of "Our Building, Our Responsibility," the transformation is clear. By fostering a culture of scholarship, the school is preparing its students to excel academically and become lifelong learners who contribute to their community. Through this innovative and intentional focus, North Star Elementary is proving that the road to success begins with a simple but profound question: "Are you prepared to be a scholar today?"

## RRHS GRADES 7-12 MEALS ON WHEELS

Culinary 1 recently completed their final project of creating a mock food truck business. Students decided on a theme, name, and design for their truck and then worked to create a menu and a business plan for their truck. After trying out a few of their recipes in class, they chose one to make for the judges. Judges scored students on the taste of their food, creativity, and truck design. 
### TRY, TRY AGAIN

Students in Strasser's CIS Chemistry class ended the year with an Acid-Base Titration Lab. Students were tasked with finding the unknown concentration of a base (sodium hydroxide) using a known concentration of an acid (hydrochloric acid). If students got the volume of base correct, the hot-pink color would NOT be present. Fortunately, they had multiple trials to get the right amounts!









### A CAREER AS AN ENGINEER

Students in Mr. Foster's Engineering class had the opportunity to tour ASV-TEREX and MN North-Itasca College in Grand Rapids. These Engineering students spent 2nd quarter learning how to use a 3D modeling software called SolidWorks.

While touring ASV, students got to meet with two engineers and learn how they use 3D modeling software to design their tracked machines. Students also got to tour their facility and see how all the parts were designed, manufactured, and assembled into a finished machine.

After the ASV tour, the group stopped at MN North-Itasca College to learn about their Engineering program. Students interested in pursuing a career in Engineering learned that MN North-Itasca and MN North-Virginia would be two great options to start their post-secondary education in the field of Engineering. They also learned about how to earn a 4-year Engineering degree at IRE-Iron Range Engineering.









### **BEYOND THE WALLS OF RRHS**

Kicking off 2nd semester, Rock Ridge High School students were given a unique opportunity to attend the Nancy Daughtery retrial at the Virginia Courthouse which provided them with an educational experience that extended beyond the classroom.

This exposure allowed the high school students to engage with the real-world applications of forensic science and criminal justice, sparking their interest in future career paths in these areas. Witnessing the trial firsthand deepened their understanding of positions in these career fields and made for quite an unforgettable experience that certainly highlighted the complexities and significance of justice in our local communities.

Reminder: Anyone born after December 31, 1976, must have a Snowmobile Safety Certificate or a driver's license with a snowmobile endorsement to legally operate a snowmobile in MN.
