### 5TH GRADERS CONNECT MATH, CONSTRUCTION, AND WRITING

Fifth graders in Mr. Cremers' class recently wrapped up an exciting cross-curricular project that blended math, hands-on construction skills (in our very own North Star Pohaki Lab), and creative writing.

After completing their fractions unit in math, students applied what they learned in a practical and engaging way by designing and building their very own book binders in construction class.

Using precise fraction measurements, students cut materials and assembled functional binders that showcased their understanding of accuracy, proportional thinking, and real-world application of math concepts. Their craftsmanship and attention to detail were impressive, and the pride they felt in creating something tangible was clear.

The project didn't end there. Students then took their binders and transformed them into fully original books that they wrote, illustrated, and organized themselves. From imaginative stories to thoughtful reflections, each book became a personalized showcase of creativity and hard work.

This project beautifully highlighted how learning is interconnected. By using math to build tools for writing, students experienced how academic skills can support one another. # RRHS GRADES 7-12

## ROCK RIDGE HIGH SCHOOL CELEBRATES A MONTH OF ACHIEVEMENT, LEADERSHIP, AND WOLVERINE PRIDE

Rock Ridge High School has experienced a remarkable month filled with student achievement, hands-on learning, and a growing culture of responsibility that continues to define what it means to be a Wolverine. Across academics, activities, leadership, and safety, students and staff have embraced the belief that success is not accidental—it is the result of a community living out “Our School, Our Responsibility.”

This month, Rock Ridge students shined in academic competitions, including outstanding performances in the Voice of Democracy audio-essay contest. Lucia Steele earned first place, Abigail Deedrick took second, and Noah Marks finished third—an incredible representation of the thoughtful, articulate students within our school.



In STEAM, students brought learning to life as Mr. Caddy's eighth graders applied real-world concepts through circuitry and electrical design, demonstrating the impact of hands-on learning. Meanwhile, 80 Rock Ridge students participated in Manufacturing Month tours across Duluth and Superior, connecting classroom instruction to meaningful career pathways in welding, small engines, and advanced manufacturing.



Rock Ridge's Career & Technical Education programs also reached a new milestone as Building & Construction students showcased “The Wolverine”—a fully student-designed and student-built ice-fishing house—during a public open house. The pride on display was unmistakable, proving once again that students rise to exceptional levels when given the opportunity to build, create, and contribute. As Principal Manni noted, these projects take learning to the next level and reflect the innovative spirit of the Iron Range.







The school also celebrated another major accomplishment as Rock Ridge High School received an international design award for its state-of-the-art, student-centered facility. This recognition highlights the creativity, collaboration, and vision that shaped a building designed not just for instruction, but for community, connection, and future-ready learning. The building itself has become a daily reminder of the possibilities that occur when a district dreams boldly.



School culture continued to strengthen as staff and students worked together to reinforce expectations around hallway transitions, locker use, attendance, and responsible behavior. Weekly problem-solving meetings helped staff align expectations, address concerns such as class skipping, and apply the Broken Windows Principle to maintain a clean, orderly environment that supports positive behavior. Principal Manni also delivered an important winter driving safety message—reminding students that safe choices behind the wheel protect lives, particularly during harsh Minnesota winters.

Student leadership remained front and center as Rock Ridge continued empowering students to take ownership of school cleanliness, safety, and welcoming environment initiatives. These efforts, paired with strong staff presence and consistent expectations, have helped strengthen the culture of accountability throughout the building.
